### THEMES AND DISCUSSION

**The Couch Discussion** — Two views of the universe are offered—one is a universe without any meaning or purpose, the other is one in which all things happen for a reason. Discuss the two themes of hope and fear.

**The Son Reading the Book on Aliens** — What inferences are made about the aliens? How might this be the movie communicating an underlying worldview.

**The Theme of Providence** — The movie has strong providential overtones...that all things happen for a reason. Does this concur better with an atheistic, pantheistic or theistic worldview? Discuss each in turn.

### ALIEN PERSUASION



ET—Exists? Doesn't Exist? What difference would it make to you? Your Faith?

If an alien were to land and tell you "God does not exist!" What would you say to her?

What would you say to someone who assumes there are Extraterrestrials due to the vast size of the Universe? What if someone said "Why did God make such an enormous universe and leave it virtually empty? It seems to have no purpose"

#### God or Aliens— Salvation Themes

Have you observed in our culture that some seem to think that salvation will be found in extraterrestrial life? SETI, Carl Sagan's *Contact*, and the general hope that they will have all the answers we need.
